TOWN GENERAL ELECTION TUESDAY, AUGUST 18, 2020

The Town of Bay Harbor Islands will hold its annual Municipal Election to fill two seats for Town Council for a four-year term on Tuesday, August 18, 2020. All Town residents who are registered voters are urged to come to Town Hall to cast their votes on election day. Vote for two of the three candidates. Remember to bring your voter's card and identification. The Town's only polling location will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at **Town Hall, in the Second Floor Council Chambers, 9665 Bay Harbor Terrace, Bay Harbor Islands, FL**

Important dates to remember:

- **Last day to register to vote is Monday, July 20, 2020**
- **Overseas Ballots are scheduled to be mailed out between July 2 and July 4.**
- **Domestic Ballots are scheduled to be mailed out between July 14 and July 16**
- **Last day to request a Vote-by-Mail Ballot is Saturday, August 8, 2020.**

2020 HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS

WHAT TO DO NOW

- **SAFELY TRIM BACK ALL TREES** that are in your property and have grown close to FPL electric lines and other utility lines.
- **BEFORE A STORM IS ON THE HORIZON** put heavy landscaping debris and bulk items out for pick-up.
- **REVIEW YOUR HURRICANE PLAN NOW.** With the coronavirus crises, early preparation is more important than ever. Prepare your home and plan your evacuation route and destination.
- **AT-RISK SENIORS AND RESIDENTS** needing medical care or equipment and require transportation assistance during a mandatory evacuation should register with the Miami-Dade County Emergency & Evacuation Assistance Program (EEAP) in advance of any storm. If you or someone you know requires assistance, call 311.

WHEN A STORM IS CLOSE

- **PROTECT YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY** by securing windows and doors with Miami-Dade County-approved storm shutters. Bring in patio furniture, garbage cans, bins and other items that are not secured and could become airborne. Unplug all appliances and if power is lost, only use flashlights, not candles.
- **BAY HARBOR ISLANDS IS IN ZONE B** in the Miami-Dade Storm Surge Planning Zones. Oceanic storm surge and interior flooding is possible. If flooding threatens your home, turn off electricity at the main breaker. Stay in a sheltered room in your home and away from windows. Do not leave your home until the storm is completely passed.
- **A MANDATORY EVACUATION MAY BE ORDERED** meaning residents should leave coastal areas. Evacuation centers will open, but are considered as a last resort. You are encouraged to stay with family or friends in a non-evacuation

area. Make your plans now. If evacuations are ordered and you decide to go to a county shelter, visit www.miamidade.gov/hurricane or call 311 to find the closest available shelter. The Red Cross is making accommodations to enable social distancing at hurricane shelters. Bring your own proof of residency, bedding, food, snacks, medications and personal items.

AFTER THE STORM

- **MANY INJURIES OCCUR AFTER A STORM**, so stay inside until authorities say it is safe to go outside. Call the Police Department or utility companies immediately to report hazards such as downed power lines, broken gas or water mains or overturned gas tanks. Monitor communications for information on safety issues, waste collection and hurricane debris pickups. Obey curfew and emergency orders when issued.
- **IF YOU HAVE EVACUATED, PLEASE BE PATIENT.** You may have to wait several days to return. Have your picture ID ready to show to authorities when returning. The Town and will assess damage including extreme flooding, downed electric lines and debris blocking roadways. Residents and business owners will be notified when to return via CodeRed notifications and the Town's website, www.bayharborislands-fl.gov.




10 Reasons to Pick up After Your Dog

- Stormwater carries pet waste and other pollutants directly into our waterways.
- Dog waste is high in nitrogen and adds nitrogen to the water. Excess nitrogen depletes the oxygen in water necessary for beneficial underwater grasses, wildlife and fish.
- Animal waste may contain harmful organisms such as Giardia, Salmonella and E. coli that can be transmitted to humans and other animals.
- Roundworms and hookworms deposited by infected animals can live in the soil for long periods of time and be transmitted to other animals and humans.
- Growing the number of responsible pet owners may encourage more condo and apartment building owners to allow dogs.
- No one likes to step in pet waste and spread it to their homes, cars and businesses.
- Picking it up keeps our Town beautiful and clean smelling.
- It's easy to clean up by carrying plastic baggies and paper towels in your pocket or by using the available stations around the Town.
- Neighbors will appreciate your good manners.
- It's the law!

(Can't bend over to pick up after your dog? Buy a pooper scooper. You can find them for less than \$16 online and at pet stores.)



Do Not Clog Our Sewer System by Flushing Wipes



Our sewers are designed to dispose of toilet paper and human waste only. Disposing of items such as paper towels and wipes in the toilet may lead to sewage backups in your home or business. Clogged pipes are YOUR responsibility and cost customers in Miami-Dade County more than \$3.4

million a year to clear in maintenance costs.

Please consider our sewers before you flush and dispose of paper towels and wipes – even when they say flushable - in a trash can, including:

- Make-up Wipes
- Sanitary Wipes
- Dust Wipes
- Hand Wipes
- Wet Wipes
- Baby Wipes

Mosquito Spraying in July



The summer months begin the Miami-Dade Mosquito Control's every two-week seasonal larvicide treatments in Bay Harbor Islands. The spraying takes place between the hours of 2-5 a.m. on the following July and August Thursdays: July 2, July

16, July 30, August 13 and August 27. The treatment is strictly proactive and not in response to any immediate health threat. The larvicide used is an organic product not harmful to humans, pets, bees or aquatic areas.

Remember to Drain & Cover

- Drain standing irrigation or rainwater and discard old items lying about that may store water.
- Use repellent on bare skin; DEET at 20 to 30 percent concentration works well for most people when used according to label directions – but don't apply on infants.
- Empty and clean birdbaths and outdoor pet water bowls once or twice weekly.
- Irrigate lawns and gardens to prevent water from standing for several days. Mow the lawn regularly
- For information and to report any infestations to Miami-Dade Mosquito Control by calling 311.

Highlights of the June 8, 2020 Regular Council Meeting

- Approval of a resolution requested by Mayor Bruder and co-sponsored by Council Member Leonard supporting the Anti-Defamation League as they stand against the targeting of individual communities during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Approval of an Inter local Agreement with Miami Dade County which would allow Bay Harbor Islands Police to enforce sections of the Miami Dade County Code, including but not limited to the ability to issue civil violations notices.
- Approval of Change Order #1 and #2 in favor of JVA Engineering in the total amount of \$54,602.90 for work associated with BC 154 Broad Causeway Enhancement Project.
- Approval to piggyback off of the City of Largo, Florida contract with LMK Pipe Renewal in the amount of \$500,000 for the continuation of sanitary sewer Cured-in-Place Pipe (CIPP) lining. This project will take advantage of a \$250,000 matching grant.
